Area youth visit D.C.

Jarrett Jones of Effingham, Brianna King of Hutsonville and Emily Moore of Lawrenceville represented Norris Electric Cooperative in Washington, D.C. during the annual “Youth to Washington” Tour, June 9-16. This event, sponsored by the electric and telephone cooperatives of Illinois since the late 1950s, is an introduction to our democratic form of government and cooperatives for rural youth.

The students met with Congressman John Shimkus, U.S. Senator Dick Durbin, and were among 69 rural Illinois youth leaders selected for the trip. The Illinois students joined more than 1,730 young leaders from across the country, a record high for the “Youth to Washington” Tour. In addition to the Capitol, they also visited Arlington National Cemetery, the Washington National Cathedral, several Smithsonian Museums, the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, the World War II Memorial, memorials to Presidents Lincoln, Jefferson, Washington and Roosevelt, the National Archives, the Royal Embassy of Saudi Arabia, the Newseum, and several other historical sites.

Electricity theft: Not worth the risk

Every year, electric cooperatives across the country cope with thieves—folks who deliberately tamper with their electric meter to steal power. Not only is this practice extremely dangerous, it's a serious crime that ends in hefty fines and jail time.

In 2016, Norris Electric Cooperative investigated several cases of meter theft, an increase from the year before. These involved cases in which consumers interfered with the operation of a meter or jumped power to elsewhere to lower or avoid paying electric bills. “We’ve seen people do some dangerous things—using knives, forks, magnets, jumper cables, and any number of other objects to get around paying for the power they use,” explains Tamara Phillips, general manager for Norris Electric Cooperative. “However, not only are these persons stealing from their

fellow co-op members, they’re also risking their lives and those of our workers.”

According to the Business Technologies Strategies unit, a division of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, power surging through a compromised meter can cause an electrical catastrophe. A short circuit could produce an arc flash bright enough to cause blindness and powerful enough to launch fragments of shrapnel-like, red-hot debris. Serious injury or death from electrocution, explosion, or fire often results from meter tampering. Only trained Norris Electric personnel wearing protective clothing should work on meters.

“Anytime you get into a meter base, you run a risk,” comments Phillips. “With an arc flash, somebody could get killed or seriously maimed.”

Electricity theft is not a victimless

crime. Norris Electric loses revenue and expends resources to investigate tampering. These costs are then passed on to the entire membership. Global estimates vary, but the Northeast Group, LLC, recently reported \$96 billion worth of electricity is stolen from utilities annually.

Since everyone pays for lost power, please let us know if you suspect meter tampering. Call Norris Electric at 877-783-8765 to report possible theft of service. All information can be given anonymously.
